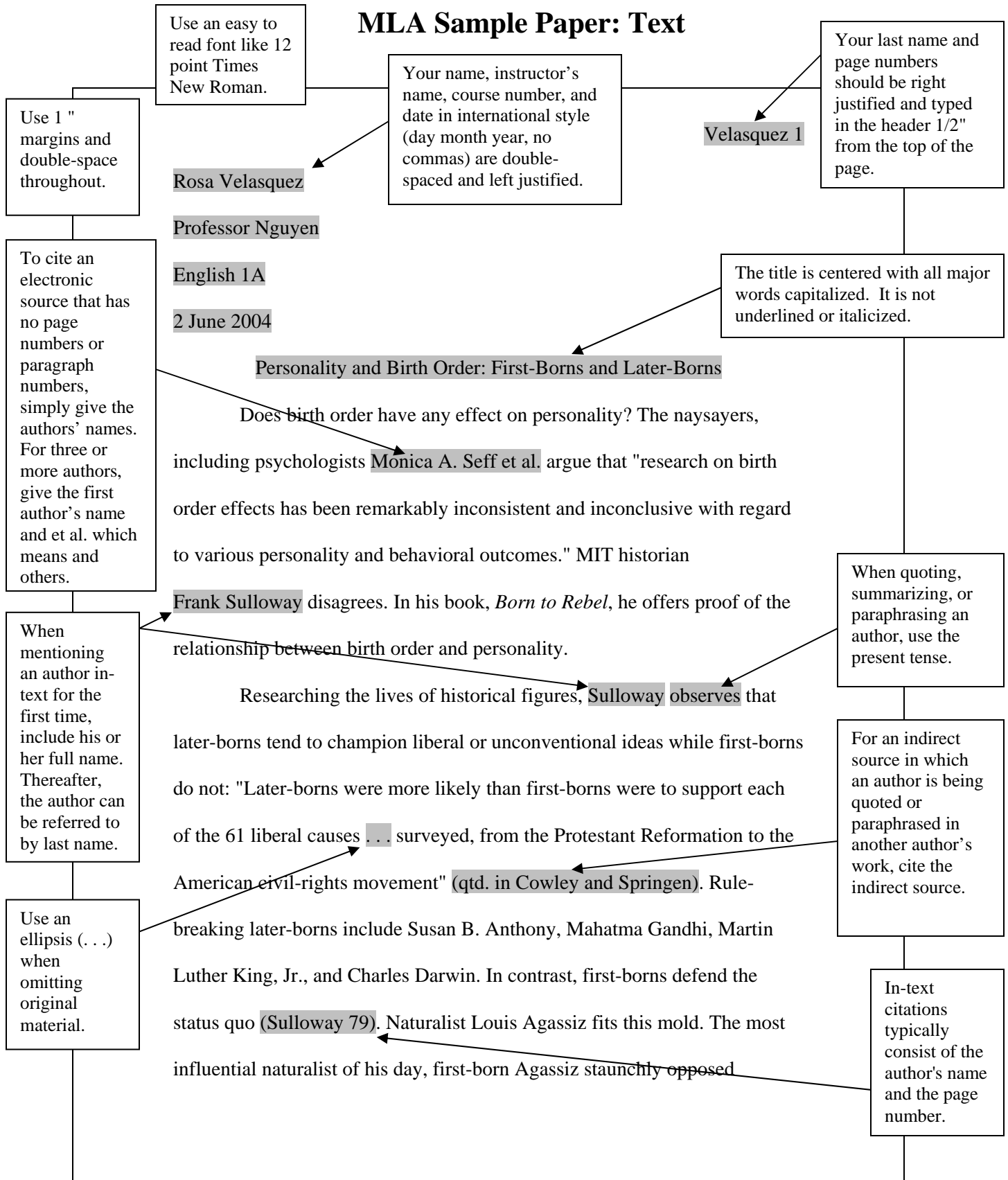


## MLA Sample Paper: Text

Darwin's radical notions about biological change:

A quotation of more than four lines starts on a new line and is indented 1" or 10 spaces.

Quoted material in a block quotation are enclosed in double quotation marks.

When Darwin proposed a revolutionary solution--that all nature's variety stems from a simple process that preserves useful variations and discards harmful ones--the authorities were appalled. "A scientific mistake" thundered Louis Agassiz, [. . .] "untrue in its facts . . . and mischievous in its tendency." (Cowley and Springen)

When omitting material from a quote that already contains an ellipsis, put brackets around your ellipsis.

In a block quotation, end punctuation comes before the in-text citation.

## MLA Sample Paper: Works Cited

### Works Cited

The works cited list begins on a new page.

Sources are listed in alphabetical order by author's last name. If there is no author, alphabetize by the first major word in the title.

The entire works cited page is double-spaced and has 1" margins.

The second and subsequent lines of each entry are indented 1/2" or 5 spaces.

While URLs are recommended for online sources, they are not required. Check with your instructor to find out what his or her preference is. Don't include http:// or https://.

When giving the location of a journal article, a DOI (digital object identifier) number is better than a URL. A DOI number won't change like URLs do, and the article always can be accessed with the DOI number at the website *Crossref*.
